



ALLIANCE HOT BILLS LIST

HB 106 (Batinick, R- Plainfield) provides that the holder of a master's degree in public administration who completes an additional six semester hours of internship in school business management from a regionally accredited institution of higher education and passes applicable state tests is eligible for a chief school business official endorsement.

HB 370 (Mayfield, D-Waukegan) requires schools to post the telephone number for the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) child abuse hotline.

HB 2369 (Harper, D-Chicago) requires public schools to provide reasonable accommodations to a lactating pupil to express breast milk.

HB 2442 (Bennett, R-Pontiac) requires student assessments for application or admissions to colleges administered by ISBE to be given on a school day during regular attendance hours.

HB 2470 (Walsh, D-Elwood) allows applicants for a Career and Technical Education (CTU) endorsement to count coursework from a technical institution and allows a test of work proficiency to satisfy endorsement application.

HB 2525 (Hoffman, D-Collinsville) would codify case law continuing the “any” cause standard that extends employer liability for injuries not directly caused by the workplace.

HB 2545 (Davidsmeyer, R-Jacksonville) requires school personnel who work with students in grades 5-12 to be trained annually in an in-service training day to identify the warning signs of mental illness and suicide behavior.

HB 2663 (Stratton, D-Chicago) prohibits early childhood programs receiving grants from the ISBE to expel children.

HB 2794 (Ford, D-Chicago) requires school districts to inform all 11th and 12th grade students of dual enrollment and dual credit opportunities at public community colleges for qualified students.

HB 2898 (Crespo, D-Hoffman Estates) removes the date (of June 30, 2021) until which a principal endorsement may be affixed to the Professional Educator License of a person who has, among other qualifications, at least four total years of experience working in the capacity of school support personnel.

HB 2950 (Conyears-Ervin, D-Chicago) requires schools to designate personnel and quarterly provide students information about what to do and resources available if the student is being bullied.

HB 2977 (Welch, D-Westchester) requires schools to include a unit of instruction for writing cursive.

HB 3139 (Chapa LaVia, D-Aurora), facilitating the work of the Balanced Accountability Model, establishes a definition of chronic absenteeism and requires school districts to collect and review the data and determine needed resources to engage chronically absent students and their families.

HB 3215 (Wallace, D-Rockford) requires schools to provide feminine hygiene products to students at no cost.

HB 3293 (Scherer, D-Decatur) requires school districts to remove insignia, stop arms, lighting, and paint on school buses no longer in service by the school being sold to the public.

HB 3298 (Scherer) waives the Substitute Teaching License fee for those that can prove they were employed as a full time teacher in prior years.

HB 3371 (Sims, D-Chicago) provides that required training in suicide awareness and prevention techniques shall last at least two hours.

HB 3745 (Conyears-Ervin) requires schools to post, in English and Spanish, information regarding local community after-school programs at each campus in a high-traffic public area widely used by students.

HB 3820 (Crespo) would further overhaul teacher licensure in the State by deepening the pool of qualified teachers available for local school districts.

HB 3869 (Wallace) requires in-service training for school personnel on civil rights and cultural diversity, including racial and ethnic sensitivity and implicit racial bias.

HB 3903 (Stratton, D-Chicago) prohibits designating a space to be used exclusively as a place of operation for law enforcement to detain students.

SB 1 (Manar, D-Bunker Hill) would replace the current school funding formula with a revised version of the evidence-based funding model.

SB 16 (Cullerton, D-Chicago) and **SB 2172 (Connelly, R-Naperville)** contain comprehensive pension reform measures.

SB 195 (Stadelman, D-Rockford) changes the Teachers' Retirement System (TRS) federal funds rate from the unfunded liability rate to the normal cost rate for school staff paid with federal program dollars.

SB 446 (Lightford, D-Maywood) creates a program for dropouts that would give double the Foundation level of support for each dropout that has been reenrolled.

SB 764 (Morrison, D-Deerfield) requires DCFS, in cooperation with school officials, to distribute appropriate materials in school buildings listing the toll-free telephone number established in the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act to be displayed in a clearly visible location in each school building.

SB 863 (Bertino-Tarrant, D-Plainfield) provides that for ISBE appointments made after the effective date, three of the members of the State Board must represent the educator community.

SB 1223 (Lightford) provides that any student in a school district may be referred by a teacher, administrator, gifted education specialist, guidance counselor, school psychologist, or parent or legal guardian to the principal for evaluation for possible accelerated placement and requires comprehensive new policies for the school district and a new accelerated placement committee.

SB 1692 (Raoul, D-Chicago) expands who can be on the concussion oversight team and evaluate a student who has been removed from practice or competition.

SB 1796 (Hastings, D-Frankfort) creates the Students Online Personal Protection Act to provide for student data privacy.

SB 1947 (Collins, D-Chicago), among other provisions, creates a definition of chronic absenteeism.

SB 2038 (Rose, R-Mahomet) would add the allowance in schools of syringe administration of epinephrine, in addition to auto-injector administration.
